Abstract

Reviews the book, Child Development: A Topical Approach by Alison Clarke-Stewart, Susan Friedman, and Joanne Koch (1985). This new text is designed as a topically organized alternative to Clarke-Stewart and Koch's (1981) chronologically organized volume for introductory courses in developmental psychology. More advanced and technical than the earlier book, this treatment includes more detail on research methods and procedures but also includes information on nonnormal development and topics such as day care, child abuse and neglect, and sex-role socialization.
